LJB's Cookin' Corner

CORN DOGS

LOYD'S NOTE: Lindy has a tradition of getting a corn dog every year from the cart near our Mardi Gras spot. (Usually the first weekend, because the prices go up the second.) When Mardi Gras was canceled this year, we decided to try our hand at making our own corn dogs for our neighborhood Super Bowl party. We settled on this recipe from NatashasKitchen.com. I think we were all a little surprised when they came out so great! Last week as we hung out on a warm summer evening, we were debating what to make for dinner when Reid suggested corn dogs! They were just as good as the first time, so I decided that this was a recipe that should be shared with you!

INGREDIENTS

- 12 hot dogs (we used bun length)
- 12 skewers (we used 6.5-inch ones)
- Peanut oil, canola oil, or vegetable oil for frying
- Ketchup and mustard to serve (Lindy says only mustard. Reid disagrees.)

BATTER INGREDIENTS

- I I/2 cups fine yellow corn meal
- I I/4 cups all-purpose flour
- I/4 cup granulated sugar
- · I tbsp baking powder
- I/4 tsp salt
- I 3/4 cups buttermilk
- I large egg
- · I tbsp honey

DIRECTIONS

I. Pour 2-3 inches of oil in a large pot or Dutch oven and heat to 350°F







over medium heat. (We used a deep fryer, but this isn't advised due to the fact that you need to hold the corn dog in the oil for a few seconds to seal the exterior before dropping it in. Watch out for your fingers!)

- 2. Pat dry hot dogs with paper towels, then insert sticks into hot dogs.
- 3. Whisk together dry ingredients (corn meal, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt).
- 4. Whisk together wet ingredients (buttermilk, egg, I this oil and honey).
- 5. Combine wet and dry ingredients and whisk to combine.
- 6. Pour batter into a drinking glass almost to the top and dip hot dogs. Put corn dog straight down into batter and give it a little twirl to fully coat the hot dogs, then swirl

as you lift up. Let excess drip off. If you see any air bubbles or gaps in the batter, re-dip to keep the dough from cracking or bursting.

- 7. Hold corn dog at an angle in the hot oil for 5 to 7 seconds to let it seal, then drop into oil (this keeps them from sticking to the bottom of the pot).
- 8. Fry 3 minutes or until golden brown. Fry 2 to 3 at a time (so you don't drop the temperature), turning them as needed to brown evenly. Transfer to a wire rack to cool.

Louisiana Civil Code 103 prescribes that when parties have lived separate and apart for the appropriate amount of time, a divorce can be rendered.

It means your spouse is in agreement and will agree to accept service of a divorce petition.

It usually also means that there are no other contested issues.

Usually, there are no children

involved, there is no community property, and no spousal support or child support involved.

So these 103 divorces can be

completed a little more quickly, because your spouse agrees to sign an acceptance of service in front of a notary public.

Now, these IO3 uncontested divorces are pretty rare, but if you think you qualify for a IO3 divorce that is uncontested, give us a call at (985) 44I-3448.
